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

THE COURSE

Welcome to what we feel is the best cross country course in America...both spectator and competition-wise. The Crystal Springs XC Course is high atop a ridge in the watershed lands east of the Crystal Springs Reservoirs, thus affording an excellent view in all directions (San Francisco to the north, Belmont and Hayward to the east, Palo Alto & San Jose to the south, and the coast range to the west). From a small area near the start/finish of the race, a viewer may see about 90% of the entire race with a good pair of binoculars. Runners are never more than a half-mile distant, and they pass by close-at-hand a total of five times during the 10 kilometer circuit. So, you are always atune to what is happening in the race.

Just looking around the course, it might appear that very little has been done ...I mean, afterall, it's just a couple of dirt roads on a hillside! Well, if you manage to look a bit more carefully, you'll see that things on the loop are well manicured, and that there are signs, and also permanent finish-chute areas. The improvement of this area for cross country running has been a long and difficult, albeit rewarding task for a few dedicated individuals. For those runners who've been around a few years, perhaps you can remember when no one was allowed to go on the other side of 'the fence'...for any reason, jogging or whatever. The San Francisco Water Department, who owns these lands, wanted to preserve the beauty of the area, and so obviously the best way to do this was to keep people out altogether. Slowly, more and more people managed to violate the rules by jumping the fence and running through the watershed...and nothing changed. The beauty remained. Policy changed.

Soon there were high school cross country races over the rolling hills, and everyone seemed happy. So, with continued good use of the lands by running groups, development progressed rapidly. What you see today is primarily because of the cooperative efforts of College of San Mateo's track/cross country coach, Bob Rush, and the San Francisco Water Dept. In particular, Ed Fonseca (Asst. Mgr., Peninsula Div.) and Archie Akers (Watershed Keeper & Supervisor) have given athletes their support. Plans are being made to further improve the area for running, and its use will remain open to all as long as we 'keep it clean'. So please use the waste cans that are provided. Thanks for your cooperation.

We hope that when you return home you will keep fond memories of our course, and hopefully the nationals will return here again in a few years. By that time, things should have improved considerably. RONALD REAGAN

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
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Who's Running?

The four-time defending champ versus the American record holder at every standard track distance over one mile...that's how the individual battle seems to shape up in the 1974 running of the National AAU Senior Men's Cross Country Championships. Olympic marathon champ, Frank Shorter, will be out to make it an unprecedented five straight harrier titles, while Steve Prefontaine is competing in his first AAU overland race. In fact, this is the first time that Pre and Shorter have met in a cross country meet.

Shorter won the AAU 10K track title this year before departing for England and law studies, while Pre compiled probably the finest season ever by an American distance runner in 1974--8 U.S. standards, indoors and out, to give him possession of all national bests from 3000 meters through 10K. But he can also run cross country, having won three NCAA titles while at Oregon.

While their battle looms as the prime man-to-man tussle, they will be challenged by perhaps the best field ever for this championship race. Taking aim at the two defending champions will be the likes of Nick Rose, a close runnerup to Pre in last year's NCAA harrier title meet. It wasn't until the latter stages of that race that the Oregonian managed to run down the fleeting Englishman from Western Kentucky. Rose is one of the heavy favorites to win the NCAA this fall as we take our program to press..his only loss in the past two seasons coming to Pre in the 1973 championships. Several others loom as possi-

ble challengers, most notably Knoxville TC's Doug Brown, runnerup in last year's AAU XC Championships. Brown is the American record holder for the steeplechase at 8:23.2 and has won the past two NCAA titles over the barriers. This year's Boston Marathon champ, Ireland's Neil Cusack, now competing for the New York AC, is also rated as a good bet for the title, and seems to be in the best shape of his life. His recent win in the prestigious Florida Forest Festival Run indicates he will be a definite threat for first in this race. Oregon's Paul Geis, who is in the process of picking up where Pre left off, has a quick 12:55.8 three-mile to his credit this year on the track, but it remains to be seen if he can do the job on the rugged Belmont hills. Canada's Grant McLaren is one of the best consistent competitors in North America and holds the Canadian record for 5K. He recently won the highclass Springbank 4-miler against a tough field. And Pacific-Eight champ, John Ngeno of Washington State, could also turn the tables and come up the winner. He obliterated Pre's Stanford coure standard at the title meet with his 27:37.6 (old mark was 28:05).

Pre leads a strong Oregon TC team which includes Geis, Kenny Moore (4th in the Munich Marathon), and Mike Manley (a sub-8:30 steepler). Florida TC's three-

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

time champs will be hard-pressed by the Ducks, as well as at least four other very well-balanced squads. Last year's team runnerup, New York AC, will be running without the services of Dick Buerkle, but looms very formidable with Cusack, Boston Marathon runnerup (twice) Tom Fleming, Irishman Ed Leddy, and ever-present Marty Liquori (8th in last year's run). Florida will run their 'standard five'--Shorter, 1973 3rd-placer Jeff Galloway, Jack Bacheler (9th in Munich Marathon), Barry Brown (sub-8:30 steepler), and Ken Misner, ās well as middle-distance ace Byron Dyce.


Two squads that are loaded with foreign talent could very well come out on top of the heap. Western Kentucky's Hilltoppers were favored at the NCAA (about 8 hours after we go to press) after going 1-2-4-5 in their NCAA Division meet. The lack of a strong fifth man could hurt their title chances in today's race, however. Besides Rose, they bost the likes of fellow Englishmen Tony Staynings, Chris Ridler and Dave Long in the top slots. Eastern New Mexico brings a solid Kenyan contingent that is further bolstered by the presense of UTEP ace Wilson Waigwa (also from Kenya). They are two-time NAIA harrier champions and feature Olympic 800m third-placer Mike Boit and versatile Philip Ndoo, winner of the recent Charleston Distance Run. ENMU's Dennis Williams was the NAIA individual harrier titlist in 1973.

The darkhorse, so to speak, for the team title, would be the Colorado TC from mile-high Boulder. The altitude-trained club is loaded with seasoned veterans, including internationalist Ted Castaneda who has done 13:10.6 (same as teammate John Gregorio). Always full of surprises, this team has fifth-placer John Lunn, a real 'darkhorse', in the 1972 title race. Rick Trujillo (Pikes Peak Marathon recordholder) and dependable Mike Peterson round out their 'veterans', while NAIA 3rd placer Charles Vigil makes them even more formidable.

Several other clubs have the depth to surprise and sneak into the top five slots. The Philadelphia Pioneers have put together a good distance squad for the first time with the likes of Greg Fredericks (former American 10K record holder at 28:08), Charlie Maguire (1973 AAU 6-mile titlist), and Reggie McAfee (3:57.8 miler). Iron-man Tommy Fulton, who ran so many races in the NCAA College Nationals a few years back, gives further depth to a squad that could surprise. Club Northwest is led by 12:57 3-miler, Don Kardong, and 1974 AAU steeple champ, Jim Johnson. With strong performances from their other runners, the Seattlebased crew might knock off a few of the better teams. Jamul Track Club, from the San Diego area, has a good start with 1973 USTFF XC Champ, Ed Mendoza. Steepler Dale Fleet (8:37) and ex-WSU teammate Dave Harper add further class. The always dangerous Beverly Hills Striders are led by Bayto-Breakers champ Gary Tuttle, who has a 28:35 best for 10K (this year). They also have Pac-8 runnerup, Terry Williams and Ron Pryor (27:52 for six miles in 1972). Bill Scobey gives added depth to the team.

Host West Valley TC has never finished worse than sixth in this meet in the last four years (the only 4 times they've run), but they will have to go some to manage that trick this time. Led by American Hour Run record holder Bill Clark (12 miles, 527 yards), 1972 AAU steeple titlist Jim Dare, and 1971 Boston Marathon winner Alvaro Mejia (3-time Olympian from Colombia), the team has the depth (probably eight runners within a minute), but lacks the one or two high finishers that are necessary to finish close to the top.







Other top individuals include: American 3-mile indoor record holder, Tracy Smith; International Junior X-C titlist, Rich Kimball; 1974 NCAA-III and IC4A goldmedalist David Moller of the Univ. of Rochester; 27:48 six-miler, John Jones; 2:20 marathoner and 27:23 six-miler Scott Bringhurst of Utah; 3:55 miler Dennis Fikes of the Quantico Marines; Canadian marathon champ Tom Howard (2:14:34); 1973 National 20K titlist, Bill Rodgers of Boston; Duncan Macdonald, former Stanford miler with a PR of 3:58.4; Hans Menet, runnerup to Ed Mendoza in last fall's USTFF title run; Domingo Tibaduiza of the Univ. of Nevada, who has finished in the top dozen in this race for two years straight; and super-prep Eric Hulst (8:50 two-mile as a sophomore).

All this talent, and undoubtedly one or two darkhorses, add up to a mighty competitive race over the 10K route. The course standard of 31:51.4, set by Colombian, Domingo Tibaduiza earlier this fall, is indicative of the difficulty factor... he is South American record holder for 5K at 13:43+. It will probably take a sub-30 minute time to win this race, but not too many will probably go that fast.



So get your juices going and good luck if you're a competitor. If you're a spectator, we hope that this course will be enjoyable for you. The Crystal Springs XC Course is probably one of the most 'viewable' circuits around. We appreciate your attendance and welcome all comments on the course, the race, and anything else that strikes you as either good or bad about what you see today. Please mail all comments to: WVTC, P.O. Box 1551, San Mateo, CA 94401. -- Incidently, the 50¢ admission fee, which we trust was not excessive for the caliber of competition you'll see, is channeled back into our club's and the area's running program...so think of it as a charitable 'donation'.

Awards will be given out at Ralston School (on Ralston Ave. just east of Hallmark Dr.) about 1:30 pm today. We hope that most of you can make it for the presentation.
