Ames, Ia., Nov. 15 /from Chris Murray/—Peg Neppel of host Iowa State broke the field on the hilly second mile of the 3M course to win the first open AIAW collegiate championship and lead her team to a narrow 96-104 victory over Penn State.

Neppel, who won this race last year when it was held as an invitational, led the pack through the first mile in 5:25. After stringing out the front group on the hills, Peg passed the 2M mark in 11:05, with only Tena Anex of Davis, Brenda Webb of Wright State and Chiu-Shia Lee of St. John's anywhere close.

Neppel kept on the pressure with a 5:26 last mile and the finish order changed little in the final mile except for a strong move by Christen Bankes of Penn State, who stormed up to take third.

Pre-meet team favorite lowa State missed the services of injured Carol Cook, AAU 10,000 champion, and was lucky to escape with its 8-point winning margin over up-and-coming Penn State.

AAU WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIP Bjorklund Easy Defender

Belmont, Calif., Nov. 29—Sizzling a course loaded with more ups and downs than a pelican with flight problems, Lynn Bjorklund opened a 30-yard lead over top challenger Julie Brown of the LATC with a 4:56 first mile, and continued on to win her second consecutive AAU title by a comfortable 20 second margin in 16:24.

Brown, looking fresh and disgusted, finished second over the three miles in 16:44, while Sue Kinsey of the San Fernando TC nudged remarkable 14-year-old Eryn Forbes of the Portland TC by one second, 16:52 to 16:53, for third. Cindy Bremser of the Wisconsin TC was the only other runner to break 17:00 (16:57) on a cold, raw, windy day.

"I was working all the way," commented Bjorklund, now representing New Mexico International. "I was scared of everybody—the girls from back East—just everybody. They're all so good," summed up the *very* good New Mexico freshman.
