## National x-country trials Saturday

SAN MATEO—The 7½ miles they run Saturday in the Belmont hills will be lot tougher than the 5,000 miles the top seven finishers travel next month following the United States team trials for the World Cross Country Championships in Chepstow, Wales, Feb. 24.

Many of the top distance runners in the nation, led by National AAU marathon champion Gary Tuttle, will be competing over the specially designed 12-kilometer course in the San Francisco watershed.

Under the supervision of Bob Rush, cross country and track coach at College of San Mateo, which is sponsoring the event, the Crystal Springs course has been revamped for the trials, both in length and with the additions of several log jumps.

Members of Rush's CSM team, along with anybody else he could corral, did most of the work on the course.

The end result found Joe Henderson, editor of Runners World Magazine and unofficial czar of international cross country running, huffing and puffing after running the course, which he praised as being "obviously laid"

out by runners for runners.'

The course consists of seven log jump barriers and 7½ miles of tough hills, switchbacks and deceptive slopes.

Toughest part of the course is Ngeno hill, named after Kenya's John Ngeno, who won the 1974 national AAU crown there.

Unlike the normal crosscountry races on the course, this one will not only have the log jumps—in which two hefty-sized logs are laid across the path—but the runners also will actually reverse themselves, running the entire layout in both directions.

"I don't know of any course like it," Henderson says.

Rush, who took the event on short notice, just one month ago, and has neither sponsors nor budget, has had trophies donated.

If all goes well, there is a chance, say Rush and CSM Chancellor Glenn Smith, who will be the starter Saturday, they will form a committee to bid for the World Championships sometime in the not-too-distant future.

About 200 runners, including ex-Stanford star Don Kardong and current Card distance ace Tony Sandoval, are expected to be on the line for the 10 a.m. start.

As entries for the trials are being accepted up to one-half hour before the start, there is no way of knowing what other standouts will be in the field.

Right now Rush, with an apology to the farmers, is keeping his fingers crossed for continued good weather, at least until 11 a.m. Saturday.
