HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Athletic programs are the best bargain in education today, says Brice Durbin, executive director of the National Federation of State High School Associations.

"I think we've all done a pretty poor job of selling that to the people," said Durbin, whose organization represents some 20,000 high schools in the United States and Canada. "Our reports show the cost of operating a sports program is less than one percent of the school budget.

"Rockford, Ill., dropped all of its sports programs for one year. They discovered the absence of the program had a disastrous effect on morale and on allied groups such as the band and cheerleaders. When they relaized what they had lost, they reinstated everything and even added a few more.

"If you look at what you get for your money, a total athletic program may be the best bargain in the educational system."

Durbin said finances are the most common problem in prep school sports. He also challenged figures said to indicate an increase in sports injuries and says liability suits are threatening the future of scholastic football.

"There's no denying we have serious problems, especially with football helmets," said Durbin. "But contrary to a lot of reports, football injuries have been significantly reduced in the past three years.

"I was really upset by the Sports Illustrated articles on brutality. Their figures were so distorted, I challenge their accuracy.

"The figures we've received from the states indicates the number of players who need the attention of a doctor isn't even close to the figures the magazine used.

"In Wisconsin, 15 of every 100 players will go to a doctor. In Washington, it was 12 out of 100 and in Denver it was only 10 out of 100.

"The big law suits that are coming out of football today make it seem like there are more injuries than usual."

"I have a report on one case in which the boy and his parents got \$75,000. The lawyers who handled the case got \$1.5 million," he said.

"We want to protect the young men and women who play sports," said Durbin.

Durbin said the high cost of equipment has forced many schools to buy on the installment plan.

"We have many schools buying new equipment and paying it off in two or three years," said Durbin. "There has been support for promotion of booster clubs which purchase equipment and relieve the schools of some of the financial burdens.

"Like everyone else, schools have been hit by inflation. The increased number of sports and of participants has made sports programs more expensive."
